		<p>Gender, Sex and Development: Private Behaviour, Public Consequences</p> <p>MDG5 (Improved maternal health) and MDG5b (Universal access to reproductive health) have seen the least progress out of all the MDGs not only in the Pacific but also globally. The Pacific region's sexual and reproductive health scenario is characterized by persistent maternal mortality, high unplanned teenage pregnancies, high STI rates as well as high rates of violence against women. The region is home to countries like PNG with a maternal mortality ratio of 733 per 100,000 live births and a generalized HIV epidemic, Kiribati with a contraceptive prevalence rate of 18% and Marshall Islands with an adolescent fertility rate of 138 per thousand. Yet, these indicators are not taken into account while addressing the economic and social development needs of a country.</p> <p>The workshop will draw on current research, case studies, and will involve an interactive discussion to address the following questions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. What is reproductive health and why is it important in the world of development? We will look at the dimensions and determinants of reproductive health, and the impact of poor reproductive health on populations and their economic development 2. How can we approach sexual and reproductive health in our development programmes in a comprehensive way? What does this involve? Who does this involve?
